GARDENING TIPS FOR JUNE

Most of our spring flowers are over now, but what a good year it has been for tulips and daffs. Bluebells are giving us a good display, as well as our wisterias, broom and rhododendrons.

Clean your containers, refill with compost and plant your summer display, as all frosts should have gone by now. Whether its petunias, begonias, marigolds or geraniums, make sure they have drainage and also add some slow release fertiliser into the compost.

Hoe your beds on a regular basis and keep dead heading.

Spray areas like patios, shingle paths or drives on a still, dry day with a glyphosate based weed killer.

Lawns have had a slow start this year, mainly due to the cold and low rainfall. Keep them trimmed regularly, varying your direction of cut if possible.

Edge paths and borders to keep them looking neat and tidy.

In the salad area sow radish, oriental leaves, spring onions and lettuce in small amounts to keep you in salads.

In the veg patch, sow beetroot, carrots and peas.

Plant out your French runner beans.

In the fruit area protect from birds and other pests. Harvest those lovely juicy strawberries.

Keep your pond topped up with water.

Feed fish regularly, keep on top of weeds and protect your fish from that heron.

Remember, if you have planted trees, shrubs and bedding or seeded a lawn, they will need watering until established.

Feed your bedding plants.

Most of all enjoy your gardening.

Our fundraising this year

So far this year we have raised just over £3,000 and donated £1440 to local charities and £700 to international causes.

International Aid - Lend with Care

Since joining this on line scheme about 3 years ago we have made 35 loans and helped 94 Entrepreneurs to develop their businesses. In turn this has helped 349 family members and created 40 new jobs. The loans have been to people in developing countries from Ecuador to the Philippines including Ruanda, Vietnam and Cambodia. Our investment of just over £600 has, on a rotating basis, enabled us to lend £2,090 of which £1,468 has been repaid and reinvested in more entrepreneurs. To date no Entrepreneur has defaulted on repaying a loan but many have transformed their lives!

Our latest loan of £45 is to Juan Torres from Ecuador. He is a taxi driver, married with one young son and lives in the small town of Catamayo. He is self-employed and started this service four years ago. Don Juan belongs to a taxi drivers association and owns his own vehicle. He works most days from 6 am to 7 pm. He requested a loan to repair a damaged engine, a full service and new tyres. On average he earns around \$850 per month.

NORTH NORFOLK DISTRICT COUNCIL

Message from County & District Councillor Nigel Dixon

County Council Election My sincere thanks to those of you who supported me in various ways and who voted for me in the County Council election on 4th May; I will continue to represent the Hoveton & Stalham Division on Norfolk County Council in addition to my representing the Hoveton Ward on North Norfolk District Council. I will endeavour to serve everyone in the Division, regardless of party colours, as I am not politically minded and I care passionately about the character and quality of life in North Norfolk and our villages in the Broads.

Many of you will know the Conservative party has a strong working majority now and thus control of Norfolk County Council. The top priorities are to recover financial stability, and to transform and redesign the delivery of services so that they are relevant to today's and future needs and are affordable. The past 4 years has seen unhelpful 'Party Politics' stifle innovation and delay in addressing problems; moreover, there's been far too much reliance on Reserves to balance budgets. The task will be tough but I will do my best to ensure NCC

moves forward and serves Norfolk well in future. Many of you will know I have real concerns about Planning Authorities working in joined up ways to ensure new housing approved by District Councils is matched by adequate roads, transport, employment and service infrastructure capacity, much of which is linked to the role of NCC. The next 4 years will be very challenging for NCC for many reasons, mostly related to the reduced funding from central government and rising demand from an aging population.

<u>Update on Station Rd, Hoveton</u> I have had several meetings with Roys regarding the progress in redeveloping the old Broads Hotel site and have been briefed in detail on the reasons for the delay. Equally, I have made it clear to Roys that the community and NNDC need to see the site put to good use asap; even a temporary use would see the hoarding and the site cleared to greatly improve the street-scene on Station Rd. Similarly, the much smaller site opposite could be developed separately. NNDC have been taking enforcement action against the owners of the Waterside Rooms and the Kings Head Hotel cottage, to both improve the visual condition and to redevelop the buildings, but that has been frustratingly delayed by changes of ownership. However, NNDC are now able to recommence proceedings to force the owners to take responsibility for the unacceptable appearance of their sites. Unfortunately, the law seems weighted heavily in favour of developers and owners so that getting them to comply with obligations and act reasonably is extremely difficult and long winded. However, that shouldn't deter us from using every opportunity to force the pace of change and I will keep you informed of progress.

Tunstead Road

A number of residents have contacted the Parish Council to raise concerns about the increasingly chaotic traffic congestion on Tunstead Road, particularly at the start and end of the school day. The problem seems to have arisen as a result of a decision taken by Broadland High School to place restrictions on buses and staff vehicles from accessing the school site. The Parish Council and several residents have asked the school to revise their decision, or to make alternative provisions for staff parking, in order to ease the traffic congestion outside the school. The Parish Council has offered the school alternative parking facilities at the Village Hall, but this offer has been declined.

Whilst there are outline plans for additional parking on the school site, these are at best some years off, and Hoveton Parish Council feels the current conditions on Tunstead Road are dangerous and unsustainable for all involved. However, the Parish Council cannot enforce changes to the parking situation at the school. Any local residents who have been affected by this matter may therefore wish to bring their concerns directly to the attention of Broadland High School, and help to raise awareness of the situation that's been created by sharing their experiences or photographs of the traffic congestion. Anti-Social Behaviour In Hoveton

Hoveton Parish Council was disappointed to receive recent reports of anti-social behaviour in the village. Residents have raised concerns about groups of young people who have been seen scribbling on pavements, throwing stones, and acting in an intimidating manner. The Parish Council has been in touch with Norfolk Constabulary to request that anti-social behaviour in Hoveton be considered as a new policing priority, and to pass on residents' requests that more be done in the village in terms of crime prevention. In the meantime, residents are advised to report anti-social behaviour to the police as or when it takes place, using the 101 non-emergency number (though in an emergency, residents should always call the police on 999). WROXHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

"A single community divided by a river" was the phrase used at a recent meeting between Wroxham and Hoveton Parish Councils aimed at exploring ways we can work together. Four councillors including Wroxham Chairman Barry Fiske and Hoveton Chairman Martin Richmond met to see how we can work together more effectively for the benefit of our two villages.

The result is the setting up of a new body - the Wroxham and Hoveton Joint Action Group - which will meet regularly to explore areas of common concern and how we can help each other and provide a more effective service for our residents.

Cllr Fiske commented: "Wroxham and Hoveton are effectively a single community but we each have a different district council. We don't even have the same local police beat manager. While we can't change the way local government is run we hope that by working with our friends in Hoveton we can at least speak with a single voice on matters of joint concern. We hope that our collaboration will bring about a common benefit."

One of the first fruits of this collaboration will be the holding of joint parish council surgeries. "About half the phone calls to the Wroxham Parish Clerk are actually from people living in Hoveton, "added Cllr Fiske. "We even have people turning up to Wroxham Parish Council surgeries who want to talk about issues in Hoveton so it would make sense to have councillors from both councils together for a single surgery."

Other issues on which the two councils hope to work together include the worrying growth in traffic on the Norwich Road. Said Cllr Fiske: "We are only parish councils but we hope that if we speak with a single voice we stand a better chance of being heard."

It's hoped the new joint surgeries, to be held at Wroxham Library on the first Saturday of each month - 10.00 to 11.30 - will start on July 1. Keep an eye on our Facebook Page for the latest information and for all our up to dates village news - www.facebook.com/ourwroxham

Norwich Road Traffic

You have probably seen the most recent speed recording equipment set up in Norwich Road mostly sited at the junction of Norwich Road and The Avenue. It shows motorists the speed they are actually doing in the hope that anyone going too fast will slow down. The equipment is owned by the Parish Council and Cllr Ian Joynson who looks after it has found it has also recorded some interesting information.

Over a 3 month period there were approximately 450,000 vehicles counted travelling in the direction of Norwich. Assuming an equal number going in the opposite direction it would mean we had approaching a million traffic movements on the main road through our village over three months.

The highest speed recorded was frighteningly 75mph - recorded mid morning during a week day. It is suspected the offender involved was a motorcyclist. Average speeds generally hover just below 30 mph during day time hours but increase during hours of darkness.

A Sign Of The Times

The Parish Council is taking a new look at signage on public open spaces. After recent incidents of littering and anti social behaviour at Caen Meadow a new sign is planned which will both welcome residents and visitors but also remind them of their responsibilities in

using this beautiful community asset. It will also urge anyone seeing people misusing the Meadow to call the police non emergency number 101. Recent anti-social behaviour has already been reported to the police by the council and the police have stepped up their patrols of the area. But to catch offenders in the act the police do need people to call them when the incident is happening. Don't hesitate - dial 101.

Neighbourhood Plan

The council has now appointed a Steering Group to work on the plan which will envision the growth and change in our village over the next 20 years. The task will take around 18 months and there will be many opportunities for everyone in the village to have their say. There are four parish councillors on the Steering Group - Barry Fiske, Kim Claxton, Peter Mantle and Malcolm Allsop. There are six other residents who have come forward help - Mick Holden, Moira Holden, Susan Everett, Elaine Allsop, Jo Wicker and Linda Aspland. The council has also appointed a consultant to assist with the project - Rachel Leggett Associates of Norwich. The bulk of the cost of the Neighbourhood Plan is being met by grants from both central and local government.

Cllr John Halford

The council was saddened to hear of the recent death of its immediate past Chairman John Halford. Mr Halford had served on the council for a number of years including several as its chairman. The council observed a minute's silence at its May meeting in his memory.

ROYS NEW BAKERY

Quote from Paul Roy - Buying and marketing director.

"We didn't set out to use a design agency to create the look and feel for the new bakery section you see in our Foodhall in Wroxham but we found nothing "off the shelf" really worked. So when the design house we approached created such a nice looking blueprint that met the various requirements of customers and bakers alike it suddenly became a reality. The brief had to reflect that although we are supermarket with volumes going through the foodhall, our own bakers make all of our bread rolls and loaves from scratch rather than just

bake them off as some supermarkets do these days and there really is a difference in quality in my opinion. Some of our products have 12 hour proving times where the mix basically rests, gradually transforming into a dough that's good to bake with - it's a more traditional method. My father, Peter Roy, used to bake to this method in the family bakery in Coltishall up until the early 1970s where some may remember Roys having a standalone bakery that delivered to many stores throughout Norfolk. By going out to local craftsmen we procured handmade sustainably designed fixtures fit for our requirements, hopefully it looks good to existing and future generations of shoppers with workmanship to match that intention and serves the dual masters of efficiency and effectiveness of display. We will be launching more variety in the coming months such as sourdoughs and will keep on striving to serve up the best quality and price that we can."

Whilst most of us are keeping our fingers crossed for a warm upcoming summer, our furry friends may be hoping for cooler times. Here are a few tips to keep in mind as the

weather warms to try to help keep our animals healthy.

Dogs:

- •Avoid walking in the heat of the day get out first or last thing in the day when the temperature is cooler. Reduce the duration of exercise and take water on walks with you.
- •Keep long and thick coated dog breeds trimmed short during the summer months. Remember dog groomers can get particularly busy so book in advance.

- •Hot tarmac can lead to burns and blisters on the pads of dogs feet before going for a walk, place the back of your hand on the tarmac, if you cant keep it there for five seconds, then its too hot for your dog to walk on!
- •Dogs die in hot cars (and caravans, and conservatories!) temperatures inside the vehicle can rapidly sore to double that of the outside air temperature within minutes. Ideally avoid making your dog travel in the car on warm days, but if its absolutely necessary then be sure to keep journeys short, keep windows open, air con on and consider cooling devices such as cooling mats, travel water bowls etc. Be sure to assess your dog for signs of overheating regularly and most importantly NEVER leave a dog unattended in a vehicle. If you do see a dog in a car on a warm day, showing signs of heat stroke, please phone the RSPCA or the police and follow their advice.

Heatstroke – signs of heat stroke include excessive panting and salivating, vomiting, depression, weakness, seizures, collapse. If you suspect heatstroke, move your animal to a cool

or shaded area, offer water, cover in cool water and contact your vet immediately – heat stroke can be fatal if not dealt with quickly.

Cats - Did you know that white haired and thin haired cats are prone to sun burn? The ear pinnae (ear flaps) are the usual site affected, and this can contribute to development of cancer later in life. The best way to manage this is to apply a light layer of animal



friendly sunblock to the ears on sunny days.

Rabbits - Like dogs and cats, these furry friends often enjoy a spot of sunbathing but aren't immune to the potential side effects. Make sure water is topped up and easily accessible at all times, and ensure areas of shade are always available.

Be Flystrike aware - this is a tragic disease and can easily catch you out. The condition most commonly affects rabbits, but can potentially happen in any species Flystrike involves flies laying eggs on/around the animal, which hatch out as maggots and begin eating on the

animals flesh. This occurs in warm weather, where there is soiled bedding or where the animal is vulnerable such as the elderly, overweight or debilitated. Avoidance involves making sure the environment is generally clean, treating wounds immediately and ensuring animals are not soiled with urine or faeces. For rabbits be sure to check their bottoms daily, and consider applying preventative spot on treatments. Should you suspect your animal of having this condition, seek veterinary advice immediately.

WESTOVER VETERINARY CENTRE

As the weather warms up we see more and more itchy dogs walk through the doors of the practice. Some of our patients are suffering from skin parasites, commonly fleas, so it is important rule these out first. If your pet is treated properly for parasites and is repeatedly itchy there is a fair chance that they are suffering from allergic skin disease, although a number of tests are required to definitively make the diagnosis.

Atopy is one of the most common types of allergy in dogs, estimated to affect up to 15% dogs. It is hereditary and can lead to allergies against the pollen of some plants (e.g. grasses, weeds, trees), fungi or various dust and storage mites. Certain breeds appear to be at higher than average risk such as the Lhasa Apso, Schnauzer, Boxer, Labrador, Golden Retriever, Poodle, West Highland White Terrier, Cairn Terrier and Jack Russell Terriers.

The initial symptoms usually appear before 3 years of age and include frequent licking or biting of the paws and the rubbing of the head along the floor or other objects. Recurrent ear infections can also be caused by atopy (in over 75% of the cases). Sneezing, a discolouration of the fur (from licking) and eye infections are also observed in some patients.



Treatment is often aimed at keeping the skin and ears free of infection and suppressing the itchiness, but we do now have another option which can reduce the allergy itself rather than just leaving us treating the symptoms. This treatment is called "immunotherapy" and involves

making specific vaccines for each individual to desensitise them to the allergens they test positive for. It is proven to reduce clinical signs in 75% of dogs and is proving to be a great help in many of our patients. It is, however, most useful when used early in the course of the disease, so if you think your pet may have a skin allergy then it would be best to book them in with your vet to discuss things further.

SHOCK! HORROR! WROXHAM MAN BITTEN BY HERON

THIS MONTH'S COVER

Had you lived in Hofa's Dun - Hoveton - in the Bronze Age, this is probably what you would have been doing at Midsummer: jumping over a fire. Or you might have done it earlier in May at the great festival of Beltane to honour the Celtic fire god Bel (or Belenus) and the goddess of lakes and rivers Belisama and to celebrate new life.

The people living in the Dun (enclosure) of Hofa the Chieftain, not far from the present village centre, would have been glad to celebrate new life, as their lives were probably governed by death and funerary rites, for Hoveton was then bounded by a huge cemetary which in old English was called 'the place of the dead' or, as we know it, Belaugh: that name also has resonances of old Bel. The cemetary may have been like that discovered at Irthlingborough in Northamptonshire, and it ran from Coltishall to Belaugh Green and beyond: a huge site, with attendant burial mounds and hutments, and perhaps a wood henge at its heart. People would have come for miles to the great ceremonies at Belaugh, and it is entirely possible that the glacial outflow channel which cuts across the Belaugh Road found use as a ceremonial causeway for funeral parties arriving by water, especially as the setting sun shines directly along it at the Winter Solstice. Not everyone had the luxury of a barrow as a resting place and most of the bodies are likely to have been cremated or left on low willow altars for excarnation - in effect 'sky burials'. This is probably how Wroxham got its old English name of 'the homestead where the buzzards are': there would have been plenty for them to thrive on nearby. It is also interesting that St John is the patron of the older Hoveton church, for his Feastday falls on the Summer Solstice and elements of the old pre-Christian rites (including the bonfires) are still practiced under his name in many countries today. The Feast of St Peter is only a few days later, and he is the patron of both Belaugh and Hoveton St Peter churches. Perhaps the intercession of St John and St Peter was thought to be especially powerful in countering 'the old religion' still practiced here when St Fursey and his missionaries started working out from their chapel at Burgh Castle!
